Willow BID wins funds to improve estate navigation

Transport for London (TfL) has confirmed that Willow BID has been successful in its application for Bids4BIDS funding. It was one of only two applications that received the full match funding sought. This will be in addition to the likely match funding offered by Merton Council.

The timing of this funding opportunity was fortuitous in that we had developed the Wayfinding project with Jonathan Docksey of Design JD and we were considering financial options to implement the project.

The funding will be used to install new, bespoke signage for vehicles, cyclists and pedestrians including those that have travelled by car. In addition to this, the estate will be divided into five colour zones with each zone being depicted by coloured banners hanging from the lamp posts.

This will bring many benefits to businesses including their customers, suppliers and visitors being able to find their way quickly, thus reducing the frustration and friction that we currently experience caused by the logistical difficulties on the estate.

The traffic congestion will also be greatly reduced as those vehicle drivers unused to the estate will find their destination more quickly and overall the 'maze' effect will be greatly reduced.

This funding will prove critical as it will ensure that not only will there be a comprehensive implementation of the proposals, as opposed to a diluted version to satisfy budget requirements, but also the new signage and banners will be introduced over a relatively short period as opposed to a staggered, piecemeal approach.

We owe our gratitude to Tracy Francis (Charlie Apple, the marketing consultants) who was instrumental in advocating the merits of the Wayfinding project in our successful submission to TfL.

We all should be aware that we have to demonstrate the positive results to TfL and this will require your cooperation in providing feedback via Willow BID to TfL.



Work commences on the bridge reopening

Merton Council has confirmed that work has commenced on Willow Lane from its junction with Carshalton Road to the end of the one-way system which includes the two bridges.

This initial phase includes cutting back the vegetation and tree clearance, new fencing, improved footpaths, resurfacing the road, signage, lining and street lighting. Providing there is no intervention of unforeseen circumstances, this work should be completed by the end of March.

Survey work was conducted to produce the basis for designing the remedial work of the bridge over the tramline. The proposed remedial work will require the agreement of Network Rail.

Once agreed the work then will be able to commence on the bridge that will have a three ton weight limit. When completed, it will remain a one-way access route into the estate and there will be a 7ft gate to limit the size of vehicles entering.



One of the core BID objectives sought by businesses was the reopening of this access route, which has been closed for six years. While this has not quite occurred yet, this is extremely encouraging news

and is indicative of the patience of businesses and the efforts of Merton Council and Willow BID who have maintained a constant lobby since the closure all those years ago.

Preventing Car Crime Hide it – Lock it – or Lose It

- Most vehicle crime is preventable. It can take as little as 10 seconds for a thief to steal something from your car. Leave nothing on view.
- Never leave valuable items in your car, including sunglasses, the removable radio cover and your SatNav.
- Wipe away the SatNav mark on your windscreen.
- Stolen number plates are often used to commit other offences including speeding, fuel theft and driving stolen vehicles. Consider fitting anti-tamper screws to your number plate.
- Thieves can lean in through a window and steal in a couple of seconds.
- Close windows and sunroof; lock doors, activate security devices.
- Park with care, particularly at night. Park in a busy, well-lit area.
- Never leave cash, credit cards, cheque book or mobiles in your car.
- Never leave your keys in the car – treat them like cash or credit cards.
